

Students, you are expected to return all library books and course textbooks before final evaluations. For example, if you have a textbook for your period three class (in the morning on the second final evaluations day, June 23), you must return the textbook that morning at the latest, in order to participate in your final evaluations.

Please return all books that are not needed for final evaluations to your teachers or the school library. If you have lost your book or it has sustained a great deal of damage, you will be asked to pay for the book's replacement cost. Our policy is that if you have forgotten to bring the book with you, you will be asked to provide collateral which will be returned to you once the book or books have been returned.

If you have questions about this process, please talk to your teachers or the librarian ahead of time.

If you are a student who will be returning in September 2022, you may renew or borrow TDChristian library books over the summer; however, **please note** that if there are book(s) that you wish to **renew**, they must be brought back to the library to be stamped with the September return date.

Books in the "green" display this month:

Toby Alone, by Timothée de Fombelle

Toby Loness may be just one and a half millimeters tall, but he's in very *big* trouble. His father, a brilliant but ridiculed scientist, has discovered an alarming truth about the great oak Tree that Toby's people call home: it's *alive*.

Trash, by Andy Mulligan

In an unnamed Third World country, in the not-so-distant future, three "dumpsite boys" make a living picking through the mountains of garbage on the outskirts of a large city. One unlucky-lucky day, Raphael finds something very special and very mysterious.

Gutter Child, by Jael Richardson

Set in an imagined world in which the most vulnerable are forced to buy their freedom by working off their debt to society, *Gutter Child* uncovers a nation divided into the privileged Mainland and the policed Gutter.

Lost in the Barrens, by Farley Mowat

Awasin, a Cree indigenous boy, and Jamie, a city boy who has come to live with his uncle in the North, sneak off with a band of Chipewyans to the Barrens, and their adventure proves longer and more dangerous than they could have ever imagined.

Come, Thou Tortoise, by Jessica Grant

Audrey (aka Oddly) Flowers is living quietly in Oregon with Winnifred, her tortoise, when she finds out her dear father has been knocked into a coma (or comma, as Audrey keeps calling it) back in Newfoundland.

Classroom textbooks and Library books:

When courses offered here at TDChristian require the use of a textbook, it is provided for the student. Their name is written in the designated space at the front of the book, and the book number, along with the student's name, is noted on a list. The student is now responsible for this book. This list is used when the books are collected at the end of the semester.

If the book is not returned, is lost or is damaged beyond continued use, we ask that the book be paid for so that a replacement can be purchased.

The system does not always work as well as we hope, but we ask that students take responsibility for the care and safe return of these books, which can be costly to replace.

We are always happy about the return of textbooks and library books with the TDChristian stamp on them which may have inadvertently been forgotten at home.
